





Background: New Election System

What are district-based elections?

- T.O. currently uses an at-large system to elect the City Council
- Beginning in 2024, the City will transition to a districtbased election system

"At-Large"

Voters residing within the City elect all councilmembers



"By-District"/"District-Based"

Voters residing in each district elect one councilmember from their district



Background: CVRA

Why is the City changing its election system?

- On March 15, 2023, the City received a letter challenging the City's current at-large election system
- The California Voting Rights Act (CVRA) encourages bydistrict elections and makes it easier to bring lawsuits against cities with at-large elections
- To avoid potential litigation under the CVRA, T.O. is transitioning to district-based elections



Districting Process

Events	Description
Initial Hearings ✓ May 9, 2023 May 16, 2023	Educate public and solicit input on the composition of districts.
Community Workshops ✓ May 11, 2023 (virtual) June 3, 2023 (Saturday) June 22, 2023 June 24, 2023	Empower residents to participate in the process. Tutorial on mapping tools.
Hearings on Draft Maps June 20, 2023 July 11, 2023	Discuss and revise draft maps. Maps posted at least 7 days prior to hearing.
Map Adoption July 18, 2023	Map adopted via ordinance. Final map posted at least 7 days prior to adoption.
Election Day November 5, 2024	First by-district elections held (2).

Legal Requirements for Districts



1. Federal Laws

- ✓ Equal population rule (total deviation < 10%)
- ✓ Federal Voting Rights Act
- ✓ No racial gerrymandering



2. Criteria for CA Cities

- Geographically contiguous districts
- 2. Avoid dividing neighborhoods & "communities of interest"
- 3. Easily identifiable boundaries
- 4. Compact districts (don't bypass a nearby populated area to take in a distant area)






Draw Your Own District Map


Whether you use the online tool, the paper kit, or just draw on a napkin, we welcome your maps!

Background

On March 15, 2023, the City of Thousand Oaks received a letter challenging the City's current election system and asserting that the City's at-large election system violates the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA).

The City is not unique in this situation. Agencies throughout the State have received similar demand letters prompting a shift from at-large to district-based elections. While it is unclear if the City's current system runs afoul of existing law, the cost of litigation to defend the at-large system, coupled with the track record of other public agencies that have fought similar challenges, poses a significant financial and legal risk to the City.

In light of the letter and to protect the City from financial and legal risks, Thousand Oaks has taken steps to consider transitioning its election process to district-based elections.
