



Background: New Election System

What are district-based elections?

- T.O. currently uses an at-large system to elect the City Council
- Beginning in 2024, the City will transition to a districtbased election system

"At-Large" Voters residing within the City elect all councilmembers



"By-District"/"District-Based"

Voters residing in each district elect one councilmember from their district

Background: CVRA

Why is the City changing its election system?

- On March 15, 2023, the City received a letter challenging the City's current at-large election system
- The California Voting Rights Act (CVRA) encourages bydistrict elections and makes it easier to bring lawsuits against cities with at-large elections
- To avoid potential litigation under the CVRA, T.O. is transitioning to district-based elections

Districting Process

Step	Description			
Two Initial Hearings	Held prior to release of draft maps.			
May 9 & May 16	Education and to solicit input on the composition of districts.			
Community Outreach May 11 & June 3	Forums for public input and education on the process and mapping tools.			
Release draft maps	Maps must be posted at least 7 days prior to 3rd hearing.			
Hearing on draft maps	Two meetings to discuss and revise the draft maps and to discuss			
June 20	the election sequence.			
Community Outreach June 22 & 24	Opportunities for residents to discuss and share opinions on the initial draft maps.			
Hearing and Selection of	2 nd public hearing for public input on draft maps.			
Preferred Map	Likely selection of map and election sequence and introduction of			
July 11	adoption ordinance.			
Map adoption	Map adopted via ordinance.			
July 18	Final map must be posted at least 7 days prior to adoption.			

Districting Rules and Goals

1. Federal Laws

Equal Population Federal Voting Rights Act No Racial Gerrymandering



2. California Criteria for Cities

- 1. Geographically contiguous
- 2. Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest"

(Socio-economic geographic areas that should be kept together)

- 3. Easily identifiable boundaries
- Compact

 (Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

Prohibited:

"Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party."

3. Other Traditional Districting Principles

Respect voters' choices / continuity in office

Future population growth



Draft Maps


- □ Current Draft Maps *to date*:




Focus Map 104



Focus Map 106B





Simple Paper Kit



- 2. Using the population counts on the map, ensure each district has approximately 25,427 residents.

Background

On March 15, 2023, the City of Thousand Oaks received a letter challenging the City's current election system and asserting that the City's at-large election system violates the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA).

The City is not unique in this situation. Agencies throughout the State have received similar demand letters prompting a shift from at-large to districtbased elections. While it is unclear if the City's current system runs afoul of existing law, the cost of litigation to defend the at-large system, coupled with the track record of other public agencies that have fought similar challenges, poses a significant financial and legal risk to the City.

In light of the letter and to protect the City from financial and legal risks, Thousand Oaks has taken steps to consider transitioning its election process to district-based elections.
